


The concert will take place in a marquee on school grounds and is going to be a fabulous evening of music and entertainment. I really hope to see you there.

After a whole year of planning and restrictions lifted for over night camping for schools, we finally got to complete the prestigious Duke of Edinburgh expedition in Term 5. The first expedition for the Bronze Award was set in the beautiful Marlborough downs and consisted of a

20k hike followed by an over night stay including camp craft and cooking. The weather was typical for DofE; swinging between extremes! On this weekend

we encountered a sizzling British heatwave. This did not deter

the students who were outstanding in conditions that were more similar to the Sahara rather than South of Swindon. On the route there were lots of hydration stops to keep the students on track in the challenging conditions, plus they received

a well earned ice lolly from me when we arrived in camp, to keep morale high and temperatures down.

Our second expedition for our Silver students, was to a new location along the River Severn in Gloucester. This was a three day expedition and students saw a big difference in the

temperatures from the previous weekend; the drop off location was Sharpness viewpoint which is an active port with

howling winds sweeping down river. The students adapted brilliantly to the conditions and used the tail wind to their advantage as they travelled south along the River Severn before twisting inland to the higher ground of Berkeley Castle and our campsite. The students travelled great distances over the next three days

with a grand total of 57k completed before returning to our pick up point back at Sharpness

viewpoint. A remarkable achievement by our resilient and determined Oldfield students. It was a real pleasure to spend such quality time with each and everyone of those students who took part in the Duke of Edinburgh expedition this year.



Hopefully after completing this expedition all students can now go onto completing the other sections of the award so they can receive certificates at the start of the new school year.



Bountiful books in library re-opening!

We are very pleased to see our library back up and running—beautifully decorated once again by the ingenious Mrs Pearce; librarian extraordinaire!

During the pandemic restrictions, the library has served the useful purpose of helping to house students and staff that needed the extra space for social distancing, but as we have now been able to open our new SEND building, the Hemmings Centre, we are pleased to restore the library to its former vibrant glory. Students should come and visit and see what new displays and themes are shown off here.



The Young Editors Project

In 2017, while writing The Lifters, a middle-grade book,

Dave Eggers assembled a committee of young editors aged 8-12. He gave them his manuscript and asked for their feedback. With red pens in hand, they marked up the book, and these notes made the book stronger.

"Student readers are especially important, because their enthusiasm is so pure," Eggers says. "One young reader, for example, put hearts all over the book to mark the parts she liked. She noted places where she thought I could improve the book, of course, but the enthusiasm meant the world to me. Now I can't imagine writing something for young people without getting their input."

The Young Editors Project works to unite young readers with manuscripts in progress, whether they are picture books, YA novels, or something in between. They believe that young readers can offer a valuable perspective to authors, illustrators, and publishers whether for a book in development with lingering editorial questions or a book that's ready for the marketplace. The best part of the Young Editors Project is that it does two important things: gives kids a meaningful way to participate in the publishing process and gives authors and publishers important insights about which books feel the most authentic to the age range of their readers.

The authors have noted that not only is the project an excellent opportunity for kids to feel part of the publishing industry by advising on manuscripts and building future editors, but also collapses the space between reader and author by allowing direct feedback while the book is still a work in progress.

Oldfield were invited to be part of the project and a total of 35 students from all year groups received a manuscript which they then read and commented on. The students chose between three manuscripts;

- A manuscript by Terry Lowell about three bickering children who secretly adopt Santa when he is turned
 into a baby. Now all they have to do is hide him from their parents, change his nappy, defeat an evil witch
 and save Christmas.
- **Desi Girl Speaking,** which is about South Asian teenager Tweety who, after finally landing the coveted role of lead dancer, tells her parents about her depression. Unfortunately, Tweety's parents ignore her revelation and instead think prayer will solve her so-called "issues". Tweety finds solace in a podcast titled Desi Girl Speaking.
- I, Witness: Freshta Tori Jan. The series is brand new and features first-person accounts from the perspective of remarkable young people. This one is about Freshta Tori Jan who had to pack up and leave the life she has always known in Herat following the Taliban attack. The novel follows Freshta as she navigates her new life in a different city and the discrimination she has to face as a Hazara.

The Young Editors at Oldfield School were incredible. They were not only serious about their role, but also empathetic, honest and open. Some of the students wrote such moving pieces it made Mrs Pearce and the manager of the Project cry! They were so impressed by our remarkable students that they have asked us to continue being involved in the project. Students who wish to take part next time will need to contact Mrs Pearce.

PSHE (Personal, Social, Health and Economic education) has had a busy month. Not only have we been celebrating Pride, we've been busy keeping our sunflowers alive, following Mental Health Awareness Week in May and some students have had talks from Avon and Somerset
