Dear Parents and Carers,

I would like to start this newsletter by thanking you for your support over what has been another challenging time for schools. While we have been able to experience something approaching normality in school this year, the shadow of Covid has remained with us and a significant number of students have had their education interrupted for a period of time. As a school we took the decision quite early in the year to require students and staff to wear face coverings in communal areas. We then extended this to classrooms and the response from parents was overwhelmingly supportive of the school in taking this step. You have also responded brilliantly to requests for your children to be tested before returning to school and to the government's vaccination programme. In doing so you have played a very important part in ensuring that we have been able to ensure that your children have had as normal a school experience as possible over the last two terms. I very much hope that I do not have to write you over the holiday period regarding any changes to the COVID-19 guidance for schools but will do so if anything that effects our provision next term is announced by the Department of Education.

Reflecting back over the last four months what has particularly struck me is how well our students have transitioned back to a normal school experience and how well they have settled back into their learning. I have also been delighted to see so many involve themselves in the wider life of the school in clubs, activities and events. There are many examples of this, with many students involved in school sports teams, the largest number of Year 9s I can remember participating in the Enterprise Challenge and large numbers performing in the Christmas Concert earlier this week. I could go on but this would be a very long list indeed! Of course none of these extra-curricular or enrichment activities could happen without staff involvement and I am very grateful to our staff for making these opportunities available.

We are saying goodbye to some staff at the end of this term. Richard Richardson is leaving to teach science at Hardenhuish School, Krisztina Kovacs is returning to Belgium, Sofia Villaran is leaving after 8 years working at the school as a lunchtime supervisor. Laura Gospill in leaving our SEND Department and Ruth Badahur, our school nurse, is also leaving at the end of this term. We wish them all the best for the future.

I am sure that you are very much looking forward to the holiday and wish you and your families all the best over the festive period.



Year 10 Food Tech

This term Year 10 GCSE Food students were able to learn how to cook mussels in a Thai broth. The mussels were kindly donated by Fowey Shellfish through the Fish Heroes program. Mussels are a very sustainable source of protein, their shells catch carbon, the mussels also clean the water around them, they create an eco system for other creatures and the mussels don't need to be fed, unlike most other farmed fish. Mussels are currently in season in the UK and ours were rope grown off the coast of Cornwall, so had low food miles.

"I can and I am" Bus Visit

The motivational wellbeing charity 'I can and I Am' visited the school a few weeks ago, to inspire and motivate students across a range of year groups. The project provides wellbeing sessions to secondary schools in Bath and Wiltshire with a specific focus aimed at giving young people the tools to learn how to keep their "balloons of self-belief inflated after the impacts of Covid-19."



What makes this project unique is that the sessions are run on a converted London double decker bus. Students had a presentation on the bus, and then moved onto small group workshops. The bus also has a fully fitted kitchen and students learnt how to make pizza and bread. The workshops were based around the charity's three core pillars of Belonging, Growth Mindset, and Multiple Intelligence.



On 8th December Oldfield travelled to Norton Hill to play in the county knockout cup.
