Dear Parents and Carers,



Welcome to PE and Dance Learning Area at Oldfield

Our aim within Oldfield PE and Dance Learning Area is consistent with that of the school, to provide an enjoyable and challenging experience for all students regardless of their background or previous opportunities. You will note that we spend approximately 6-8 lessons on each different sporting activity within PE in order to provide a broad curriculum and opportunity for students to experience and develop within a wide range of activities. We hope that through this process students will find a sport they enjoy and can continue with beyond Oldfield School.

One of the biggest and most enjoyable parts of our Learning Area is extracurricular sport. We have experienced excellent numbers of students participating in lunchtime clubs and afterschool which provides a brilliant opportunity for further development of the skills learnt within lessons. We have been able to offer many fixtures against other schools this academic year, some schools were hesitant of mixing with other settings during the pandemic in Terms 1 and 2 but this has steadily increased, and you can read about our fixtures later in this newsletter. We are set to have a busy Term 4 of fixtures with senior netball and boys/ girls football fixtures happening weekly. Please encourage your son/daughter to take the opportunity to join the teams and attend

lunch/afterschool clubs, especially as they are free! After Easter you can expect clubs for athletics, cricket, tennis and rounders for those who are keen to take part in the summer sports.

Some things to look forward to this academic year:

English Speaking Union Debate Competition

Many congratulations to our debate team Noah Dunford, Nathan Finch and Joe Eden Bull who got through to the second round of the ESU MACE debate. The debate's motion was 'this house would ban gambling', and the team did a great job researching, preparing and defending their arguments against Clevedon School. Only one team of six was able to progress to the next round, and while our team weren't selected, they came a very close second place and were highly commended by the judge for their performance.

Oxford Schools' Debate Competition

We have had a busy month for debate, with a different team of eight of our Year 12s competing in the South West Regional rounds of the Oxford Schools' Debate. Oxford debating is an intense challenge for the students, who are given just 15 minutes to prepare arguments for a timed debate against other teams.

On the night, our teams debated first whether politicians should be able to access private services when there are public alternatives, and secondly whether a 100% inheritance tax should be introduced. All our teams did a brilliant job on their debates, despite the difficulties presented by the Zoom format this year.

It was a busy night, with some 50 or so teams competing across the region. Only a handful of teams progressed to the next round, so special congratulations to Izzy Medley and Sophie Parkes, who have made it through to the National Finals at Oxford University in March! *Miss Holly, English Teacher*

Ultimate Frisbee

After losing their two first matches dramatically, they found their place and remained unbeaten in all their matches on the Sunday. They

It was amazing to watch their confidence, skill and excitement grow over the course of the weekend as they leapt, sprinted and did nifty throws of the frisbee across the pitch. Burn and Banish our Worries

Displaying huge amounts of resilience and self-awareness, some of our students came together with Bath Mind and The Natural Theatre Company to host a 'Burn & Banish our Worries' ceremony on 28th January. Local MP Wera Hobhouse was there to witness the emotional but empowering ceremony as students performed in front of families and friends, and then went on to a ceremonial fire, a nod to the winter solstice, to "banish" worries collected by students from their year groups.



Wera said "I was honoured to attend the lively and uplifting 'Burn & Banish Our Worries'

ceremony at Oldfield School. It was wonderful to speak with some of the students and take part in activities that they had arranged. I am keenly aware of the huge toll the pandemic has taken on our collective mental health. Our young people have been particularly impacted and it is vitally important that we support their mental health and wellbeing. My warmest thanks to Bath Mind, Oldfield School and the Natural Theatre Company for facilitating this creative, student-led initiative and for their excellent work in our community."

The event explored dealing with worries, in a performative way, and celebrated the journey the students have been on over the past year with Bath Mind and the Department of Kindness.

The event aimed to recognise the solemnness of worries and give them due respect, while also being fun and silly, encouraging lightness, creativity and playfulness. The school hall had fun-fair style stalls (which students designed and created themselves) including 'whack a worry', 'tin can alley monster worries' and the cabinet of compassion.

The event was created by Oldfield School Wellbeing Ambassadors who have taken part in creative wellbeing sessions and have also created a website: <u>www.room627.com</u>. Room 627 is a project created to help young people navigate the transition of moving from Year 6 to Year 7 with kindness, compassion and creativity.

Bath Mind said, "Oldfield School have been such a joy and pleasure to work with, enabling us to have the freedom to support young people's ideas to make them happen. Head of Year 7, Miss Abby Davies has been brilliant at



saying yes to everything that comes her way, even in these challenging times for schools!

We have exciting plans moving forward for the room 627 project including further creative wellbeing training in schools; a 'take over' of The Egg Theatre across October half term 2022 and a large interactive online event."





First Aid

The British Red Cross came in to work with a group of Year 10 and 11 students to provide them with some basic first aid skills.

They learnt the importance of dealing with a situation and how they don't have to have full first aid knowledge to help someone in need but that with a little knowledge, confidence and common sense can make a big difference to a person's recovery.

We looked at the "bi-stander effect". Why might someone be hesitant to help a stranger in need in public? We also looked at the barriers that might

prevent someone stepping in to help an individual in need.

We looked at how we can overcome these barriers by learning basic first aid, staying calm, calling 999 and keeping the individual company.


Students received really useful information on how to deal with burns, head injuries, major bleeds, a broken bone and seizures. A brief description of the different types of head injuries that can be sustained and how to tell which it may be.

We also looked at what to do if we find someone collapsed but are afraid to approach them. If we are happy to approach them then we had some training on how to prevent their airway from being blocked and how to check if they are breathing.

There is still more to learn so watch this space for part two!

The students were great at participating and learned a lot. Many thanks to the Red Cross for coming in and running the session.







New Building Celebrates Inclusivity and Longevity

We were proud to host the opening of the new Special Educational Needs Building, the Hemmings Centre. The innovative building has been purposely built to accommodate sensory and therapy rooms. The rooms help to develop children's social and emotional wellbeing, and provide the space for 121 and small group intervention. The sensory room is a blackout room, with fiberoptic lighting to provide a calming environment for students to regulate and process their emotions.

The building includes an ASD Specialist Resource Base, a bespoke package

for up to 10 high functioning ASD students, supporting them to access mainstream education and providing additional support for individual's learning needs. All of this support is already proven to have impacted positively the students that are accessing these resources.

The building incorporates a range of sustainability features, including air source heating, a green roof and the design minimises the visual impact of the building.

"The new building is a real asset to the school, and ensures we are able to help all abilities within our school community. We are grateful to the council for financially supporting this development to enable children to get the support and help they need. It is so important that these students are given the same opportunities as our other students, and the high quality support for students with additional needs aligns with the inclusive ethos of our school" said Mr Mackay, Headteacher at Oldfield.

The building is named in recognition of the exceptionally long service to the school of Sue Hemmings, who retired last year after 47 years working at the school as a Science Technician. Sue said "I was sad to leave Oldfield after all these years, it is a great place with lovely staff and students. I was once asked "isn't it boring, doing the same thing all the time?" but I'm emphatic in the fact that it was never boring, there was always different things to do, and the students always kept it interesting! I am very honoured to be recognised through the naming of the new building."

Under 19s Football Team in the Somerset Cup

On Thursday 20th January, the U19s football team travelled to Wells Cathedral School to compete in the final 16 schools in the Somerset Cup. Led by a captain Juan Kennaugh-Colegate, the team had a fantastic start to the game. Putting the opposition under extreme pressure and forcing them to play from deep in their own territory was an effective strategy - Oldfield dominated the first 10 minutes with group confidence and cohesion. This defensive effort was soon rewarded with regaining possession at halfway coupled with a quick counterattack and through ball to



Joe Peabody who finished with a lob using the outside of the boot over the goalkeeper to make the score 0-1. Oldfield were in the lead!

Following the first goal, Wells Cathedral increased their intensity and tempo. They applied a newfound pressure on the Oldfield defenders. Strong performances from Juan Kennaugh-Colegate, Dan Iles and Archie Gillett prevented the oppositions' attempts at goal on multiple occasions. Just before half time Wells Cathedral managed to score after a series of individual defensive errors. The score was 1-1. Oldfield knew that they had a chance in the game and during the half-time team huddle, the team feedback was constructive, and players' attitude was positive. The team were highly motivated and had a strong desire to win this cup match.

The whistle for the second half started, and within 10 seconds Wells Cathedral regained possession, evaded two defenders and took a shot on the goal. They scored within the first few moments of the second half to make the score 2-1. Despite conceding this second goal, captain Kennaugh-Colegate showed outstanding leadership skills and took the responsibility to lift the team's confidence. With his positive and motivating communication Oldfield responded well. It was clear that Oldfield really wanted to be back on top. Goalkeeper Oliver Coleman displayed confidence with his performance - executed some high-quality saves and made correct decisions of when to hold play or pull the trigger for a quick attack into space. Furthermore, there were multiple occasions of brilliant link up plays between Finn Williams, Jed Meerholz, Tate Hopkins, Ryan Dunn and Ollie Gray. Both Williams and Hopkins soon scored two goals to make the score 2-3 to Oldfield. Oldfield were now on top again!

But the drama didn't stop there. Wells soon reacted and scored their equaliser from a corner kick. With only 10 minutes to go the score was 3-3. Both teams competed hard in tackles with some verging on edge-of-the-laws of the game. This represented the high efforts shown by all players. Following one late challenge the referee had to speak to both team captains and warn all players from both teams of potential misconduct. 
