You continue to work with Bath Spa University as a training partnership school for their PGCE programme, providing placements for trainees in English, music, art and drama.

You have good links to primary schools, and it would be good to consider how you might further share your expertise and contribute to e.g., curriculum design and staff CPD in other settings.

Your work to develop student understanding of career pathways and communicate with focus groups led to significantly increased uptake of GCSE Drama and it would be interesting to think how you might further build on student voice and agency.

The involvement of your Year 7 and 8 'well-being ambassadors' in the Bath Mind project demonstrates the value of facilitating creative, student-led initiatives and it is excellent that you plan to extend collaborations of this kind. Likewise, it is good that you are aiming to introduce the higher Arts Award, giving students increased ownership of their personal progression in the Arts. Alongside this, it may be good to review the degree to which the students themselves are given responsibility for the planning and delivery of authentic arts experiences. With the effects of the pandemic hopefully receding, might you be ready to make even more ambitious plans for developing the Arts? With your commitment to the Arts and the strength of your offer, you are well placed, going forward, to capture evidence of the impact this has on outcomes for your students' learning and personal development. Armed with such evidence, you might, if you wish, advocate more widely, be an opinion former and make a significant difference beyond your school.'

Junior Maths Challenge Success



From Bath to big screen an interview with Bath's own 'Heartstopper'

Everyone has seen it, it's the meet-cute sensation infecting our nation. Of course, I am talking about Heartstopper. For those uneducated, Heartstopper is a queer romance story written by British author Alice



Osman that has recently received a Netflix adaptation. The show currently sits at 100% rotten tomatoes and has been on Netflix's most watched list for the UK since its release. Needless to say, the show is a sensation and pictures of the stars have been plastered all over social media, but something you might not have known, is that one of these debut actors has his roots in our historical city of Bath. Minor spoilers ahead for the Heartstopper comic and TV show.

Tobie Donovan plays Isaac, a Netflix original character described as a kind bookworm and a supportive friend. So naturally after discovering a member of this ground-breaking show was so local, I reached out and conducted an interview. Tobie mentioned how it was "difficult to adjust from the small-town vibes of Bath where everyone knows everyone" to the pandemic shot world of Heartstopper. We talked about the city and how the "everyone knowing everyone" mentality of Bath helped influence his performance of Isaac. I was curious about the audition process and was pleasantly surprised to learn of the open interview and how Tobie "sent an email to Daniel Edwards, the casting director, talking about how I wanted the role and how interested I was and the next thing I knew I had a zoom audition" and the rest was history.

As exam season is coming up, the topic turned to Tobie's head-canons for Isaac starting his exams. "History is for sure his favourite subject closely followed by English," Tobie also mentioned his love for Heartstoppers source material and mentioned in relation to the latest story arc (Nick deciding his future and university choices). Donovan said how he thinks Isaac would be "Revising for his A levels since good grades are important," [as well as looking] "at an English degree and looking after his friends." Good advice for anyone looking at their next educational steps.

Despite its appearance Heartstopper has a surprising emphasis on sports, whether this is because of the nature of it being a British show or just to create an interesting hyperbole and comment on masculinity, or most likely both. So as such I had a few sporty themed questions to ask Tobie; In the sports day episode of Heartstopper Isaac shows his incredible physical prowess by competing in the javelin and I wondered if I could pick up some pointers from Donovan. "There's a bit of movie magic involved" Tobie responded, "I did one real throw then the director came over to me and said "thank you for trying we'll give you a CGI stick"". In all honesty it was comforting to know that I wasn't the only quiet book loving nerd that sucks at javelin even if Isaac and his javelin skills are fictional. The other main athletic focus of Heartstopper is rugby and how no one understands it; "actually Isaac is stood there reading a book on gay rugby." So thankfully someone does know the rules of rugby, maybe we'll see Isaac and by extension Tobie get his boots on in future seasons?

Obviously, I wanted to pick Tobie's mind for hints to what happens next in the Heartstopper tv series. I asked him if he was to plan an arc for Isaac for the next season what would he choose? "She [Alice Osman] has got some good plans if we get a second season but I would like to explore Isaac's homelife and sexuality". In relation to this, I asked about Isaac's reading list and if Tobie had any hand in curating it; "I had little involvement in the reading list in season 1, Alice had a massive list of all these crazy books I'd just be given on set to read." Curious about Tobie's involvement I asked what he would like to see on Isaac's reading list: "It would be really funny – but not funny to see Isaac read a comfort book after something tumultuous, to recover from the anxiety". I agree the concept of Isaac panic reading Masie Mouse or Twilight to calm down is amusing if not mildly upsetting.

So that was my interview with up-and-coming Netflix star Tobie Donovan, covering everything from behind the set secrets to season two speculations. I hope if you haven't watched the show this piques your interest to watch Tobie and the rest of the cast in Netflix's Heartstopper or read the graphic novel available at any good book shop. EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

The Brilliant Club

As part of our Acceleration Programme, students in Years 9, 10 and 12 completed an academic course run by The Brilliant Club called the Scholars Programme. The tutorial-based approach placed university researchers (PhD Tutors) in schools. The PhD tutors are researchers and lecturers who taught university-style tutorials to our Oldfield students. It was a unique opportunity for our students to experience university-style teaching and complete a final assignment of 1,500-2,000 words, which was marked in university grading with students receiving a 1st, 2.1, or 2.2. Although university may not be for everyone, the scholars



programme remains an exciting opportunity for students to work alongside world-leading experts, and to develop the knowledge, skills and ambition required to make successful applications to highly-selective universities.

On Wednesday 4th May 2022, Oldfield students attended the graduation event at Bath University. The half-day event included a campus tour provided by Bath University student representatives, an information, advice and guidance session, and an opportunity to celebrate their achievements in a graduation ceremony. All students who visited the University described the experience as very rewarding, and one that has raised their aspirations for attending university when it is their time to apply. The facilities at Bath University were exceptional, especially the sports centre which includes a 50m swimming pool, impressive gym, running and athletics track, plus full-sized astro turf hockey and football pitches. The lecture theatre buildings were equally as impressive with large



halls dedicated to university-style teaching and learning. There also were many opportunities for eating and socialising in the wide selection of restaurants and cafes. The Brilliant Club will be running next year at Oldfield.

Gifted and Talented Workshop, Royal High School, Bath

On Wednesday 18th May 2022, Year 10 students from Oldfield School attended a gifted and talented conference at the Royal High School Bath. The students experienced a day of lectures and activities designed to stretch and challenge their thinking and knowledge of STEM subjects. This included science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Students arrived at the venue for a prompt 9am start and returned back to school for 3:50pm. This was a unique opportunity for our students in Year 10 to extend their subject knowledge and challenge their critical thinking. Lectures on the day included topics such as "How we'll Live on Mars", "Philosophy, Time Travel and Science Fiction", "Is it too Late to Save our Ocean?", and "Superconducting seaweed and other stories."

The enrichment opportunity was a really important eye-opener, and one which may inspire and raise student awareness of our world problems, but also more importantly ways of how to solve them in this ever-changing economic climate. Below are two student accounts of their experiences of the day.

"Going to Royal High on Wednesday was a great experience. We had four lectures from four incredible people each with amazing achievements in their field. The lectures were each incredibly thought provoking and we even got to do a science practical. It was interesting to see the process it would take to get to Mars, and all the challenges and steps that are needed to prepare and all the different things required for this to happen. Design and Technology Year 9, 10 & 12 Legoland trip

On Friday 20th May, thirty two Year 9, 10 and 12 Design and Technology students attended a LEGO Education Robotics Challenge at Legoland Windsor.

Despite the rain everyone had an amazing day out. The day involved fun STEM learning and creativity.

The Lego Robotics challenge brought Design and Technology STEM learning to life outside of the classroom through a fun, hands-on workshop. The students loved

They developed their problem-solving skills and learnt more about algorithms, sequences and inputs and outputs. As well as applying mathematical skills such as estimation, measurement and the use of angles to get their Robotic vehicles moving around the map.

Let's Make Music!





Bath's secondary schools have united to create a unique choir of young people who created and performed their own songs for The Bath Festival in May. The choir, Schools Voices, is made up of 110 young people from 11 of Bath's secondary schools. They have been creating and rehearsing with Bath Philharmonia's Creative Learning team of musicians and singers to put on two live performances, at St Swithin's Church, Walcot, on Friday 13 May as part of Party in the City, and on Thursday 19 May at The Forum as part of the Concert for the People of Bath.

The Schools Voices project was set up as a collaboration of Bath Festivals' Creative Learning programme, teachers from both state and independent schools in Bath and North East Somerset and the Creative Learning team at Bath Philharmonia. The 11 schools taking part were: Beechen Cliff School, Hayesfield School, King Edward's School, Kingswood School, Monkton Combe School, Oldfield School, Ralph Allen School, Royal High School, St Gregory's Catholic College, St Marks School and Three Ways School.

The project is particularly special because young people have undergone two challenging years during the pandemic when they were largely unable to mix widely with others, and because Schools Voices has enabled them to write their own heart-felt songs which reflect their shared experience.

Jason Thornton, music director of Bath Philharmonia, worked with music leaders Dylan Lindo Jones, Samantha Lindo and Caitlyn Newble to help the young singers achieve their creative goals. He said: "Schools Voices has been good for the kids to create their own pieces, good for the schools to be able to work together and good for the community to be able to get back into the concert halls again!"

Schools Voices has also been supported by The Andrew Lloyd Webber Foundation, The Trevor Osborne Charitable Trust and Bath Recreation.
