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An introduction to Oldfield School



Oldfield School is a successful, high-attaining 11-18 mixed comprehensive with over 1,200 students. The school benefits from a large, semi-rural setting with good transport links for students and staff.

Our school has an excellent reputation locally, and in the wider community, for academic excellence and the quality of pastoral care and support.

The school has a comprehensive intake which reflects the diversity of the local community. The most recent Ofsted inspection was in January 2020, when the school was judged to be good in all areas. In addition to recognising the good progress made by students, a strong feature of the inspection report was the inclusive nature of the school and the sense of community felt by staff and students.

Inspectors commented that staff were overwhelmingly positive about the support that they receive from leaders and on how friendly and welcoming the school is for staff.

The teaching and support staff at the school are an excellent team who work well together to provide opportunities for students to achieve or exceed their potential. The needs of our students are paramount and this is recognised by all staff, who have a common view that only the best is good enough.

Our school ethos will always be; to inspire, to learn and to succeed.

What we offer at Oldfield School

Oldfield School has always been proud of its high academic attainment, remaining consistently above the national average year-on-year.

We have experienced, enthusiastic and well-qualified teachers, committed to promoting a learning environment in which each and every student is able to achieve their potential.

Student attainment is carefully tracked and monitored against aspirational targets to maximise the progress of our students. This is also used to inform our carefully targeted and individualised intervention programme. We have high expectations with regards to behaviour and conduct and as a consequence our students learn in a calm working environment and treat their teachers and peers with respect. We recognise and reward good work and behaviour, so that students know that positive behaviour is valued.

Homework

Homework is an integral part of the teaching and learning process. Not only does it extend our students' education, it teaches self-discipline, encourages independent learning and a sense of responsibility.

We know that on entering secondary school, homework is often an area of anxiety for our students, and we try to do everything we can to help them manage this transition.

More able students

Oldfield School prides itself on the high levels of progress made by our more able students (as seen by the significant number of grades achieved at the highest level at GCSE and A level). Providing them with an intellectually challenging learning environment, and ensuring there is a wide and varied extra-curricular and enrichment programme, encourages cultural and academic stimulation beyond the classroom.

In addition we use cloud storage to enable students to access our materials to support their learning, increasing their level of independence and allowing them more control over their learning outside of the classroom.





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Nurturing and developing every child's abilities

Seeing students as individual learners and promoting a fully rounded education is at the heart of what we aim to achieve. We work in partnership with students and parents in a caring, secure and supportive environment.

Oldfield staff visit our partner primary schools to meet prospective students and liaise with their teachers.

Transition from Primary School

Students are invited to Oldfield School for an induction day at the end of Year 6 and a parents' information evening. Parents can also request additional visits to the school. There are tailored transition arrangements for students who have additional needs or who might require additional support regarding transition.

Students in Year 7 are placed in mixed ability tutor groups. The tutor will be the first point of contact for parents and students to discuss their achievements, attendance and any concerns. Tutors are supported by the Head of Year who oversees the year group, getting to know the students and helping them feel part of the wider school community.

Pastoral care and support

We take the mental health and wellbeing of all our students very seriously. We offer a range of pastoral support for students who are encountering issues, whether at school or at home. We tailor support to suit the needs of the individual student. We also have Pastoral Support Officers and a School Nursing Officer on site as well as a range of outside services who support students in school, such as the School Nursing Service and Off the Record.

Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND)

For students who may need additional support with their studies or have specific requirements, we have a full-time SENCO to coordinate support where appropriate. If your child has an Education and Health Care Plan (EHCP) or a specific learning difficulty and would like to know more about the school's SEND delivery then this is available on the school's website.

We have a house system to allow for greater social integration and encourage a positive and healthy ethos of competitiveness and community.

House system

The names of the Houses were chosen by the students and link with Bath's Roman connection. The Heads of House are responsible for organising a huge number of fun competitions and activities throughout the year, and particular events, for example, Sports Day or our famous Oldfest.

Each year the winning house is awarded the house shield for collecting the most number of house points, earned from all the different activities throughout the year. The house shield is presented at the end of year whole-school assembly.

Student leadership

We have many opportunities for students to develop their leadership skills throughout their time at Oldfield School.

School Council

The council is divided into four committees, to debate and negotiate issues concerned with the whole-school community:

- Teaching and Learning
- Behaviour for Learning
- Learning, Environment and Sustainability
- Student Wellbeing.

The committee groups are chaired by the head students and meet with the Headteacher, Assistant Headteacher and governors to discuss issues and initiatives relating to school life.

Prefects

We encourage all students to aspire to become a prefect. Year 10 students can apply to join and are selected on the basis of how well they reflect the key values of the school. They contribute significantly to the work of the school, not least as outstanding role models for our younger students.










Support for our students includes; one-to-one discussions with the Tutor, Head of Year or the SENCO, regular 'monitoring' meetings with parents/carers, or small group support (e.g. a social skills group) and/or a specific resource to support them.

We ask prefects to represent the school in many ways including; escorting visitors on tours of the site, assisting staff on open evenings, providing invaluable academic support to younger students within a variety of roles, supporting staff on lunchtime duty, and helping to guide new students through the induction process.









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SEND students have access to the Hemmings Centre, which is a purpose-built SEND building that allows students time out, sensory space, and separate rooms for provision to take place in.



Enrichment and extra-curricular activities

We believe a vibrant and wide-ranging extra-curricular and enrichment programme is an essential part of personal development and wellbeing for any student. We aim to encourage participation, providing a rich and varied range of activities.

Music, the Arts and Sport

The thriving Music Department at Oldfield School plays host to a variety of extra-curricular activities.

The Creatives Learning Area covers drama, music, art, textiles and photography. All students, regardless of experience or level of expertise, are encouraged to contribute to the extra-curricular clubs and productions, whether that is in school concerts, the annual school production or other events. This can be through playing an instrument, acting, singing, costume and set design, or choreography.

The facilities at Oldfield include tennis and netball courts, pitches for rugby and football, rounders, an athletics track, a fitness suite and contemporary dance studio. Our sports hall has a full-size basketball court, four badminton courts and we have a MUGA (multi-use games area) which is used by students in lessons and at break times. Our state-of-the-art drama studio is used for lessons and after-school rehearsals.

Learning experiences outside the classroom

At Oldfield we believe in encouraging wider experiences for all students and creating some of the most memorable moments in a child's school life.

We offer a variety of school trips, and start in Year 7 with an activities day with teambuilding games and outdoor pursuits.

Other opportunities include trips to Barcelona, Berlin, Paris, Russia, a WW1 Battlefield trip, a school ski trip, and students have the opportunity to participate in the Duke of Edinburgh Award up to Gold level.

In the summer term we run an activities week for the whole school. This includes trips abroad, day trips in the local area and further afield and many in-school activities. The week culminates in a whole school walk, making full use of our excellent location on the edge of the Cotswold Way.



Working in partnership with the whole community

Any thriving and successful school depends on the relationship with its students, their parents and the local community, and we recognise the importance of this at Oldfield School.

We appreciate that our partnership with parents is vital. Students are monitored regularly by their tutor and Head of Year.

Communication with parents

There are two parents' evenings for most year groups during the year when parents and students can discuss progress with teachers.

Parents also receive three reports each year. We send out a regular newsletter, Outlook, which covers important dates, a variety of articles and celebrates activities that students have been involved in.

Parents with internet access will also have a ParentPay account, which allows online payments to the school for trips, books etc. We communicate via email for the great majority of school communications.

Oldfield School Association (OSA)

The OSA is the Parent Teacher Association – a group of parents and school staff who raise funds for the school. These funds are used for classroom equipment, (e.g. musical instruments or cooking utensils), or subsidising a school trip.

The OSA raise money by organising events, for example quiz nights, the Christmas Fair, 'Battle of the Bands' evening (a chance for the winning band to have their song professionally recorded), refreshments at a variety of evening events held by the school, for example the New Year 7 Parent Evening, and the Celebration Evening in the summer.

The governors liaise regularly with the staff at Oldfield and welcome any comments or queries from parents and staff alike.

Governors

The governing body at Oldfield School aims to raise standards of achievement for all students, which involves providing a strategic view for the school, acting as a 'critical friend' and assuring accountability in upholding the strategic aims of the school.

The library is an essential part of our school, not only inspiring students and staff to read but to consider the world around them and wider issues that occur. The ever-changing displays make it a joyful space to learn and a peaceful haven to escape to. Our librarian runs several clubs, including Book Club, Young Editors, where students comment on actual manuscripts by real authors, helping the novels develop and get better, and Local Research Group, researching local history.

A highlight of the year is the Harry Potter Evening, where students and staff get to dress up as their favourite characters and take part in games and activities based on the novels.

The school has a successful and popular Sixth Form of around 200 students, offering a wide range of A level courses and opportunities. A level classes are small, which provides a personalised learning experience for our students.

We aim to make the transition from secondary education to sixth form a seamless and exciting experience.

Sixth Form studies carry their own pressures and stresses. At Oldfield we strive to ensure that students are well supported, positive and enthusiastic learners. They meet daily with their tutors, and the Head of Sixth Form has an open-door policy where any student can come to talk through concerns and worries. We also run a well-developed career and higher education guidance programme so that whatever our students want to do post A levels, there will be events, talks and workshops to answer their questions and meet their needs.

We believe our small class sizes, which allow for personal attention from our highly trained, specialist staff, are a key pillar to this success.


