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Dear Parents and Carers

I hope that you and your families are well as we come to the end of the school year.

It has been quite a year. The realisation that Covid was not cooperating in the Spring terms was an unwelcome reminder of the previous two years, as we had to have year groups working at home because of covid related staff absence. A school closure because of a storm was a first for me, as has been the disruption caused to school this week because of the heatwave (although it has been a long while since we have had to restrict attendance because of heavy snow). It would seem that the consequences of climate change are now something we are going to have to plan for in future years. This is, most definitely, not something I would have had on my radar when I became a headteacher.

Despite some ongoing disruption this year we have been able to return much of school life to normality and every time an event or activity has taken place this year it has been a most welcome reminder for us all as to why we chose to follow a career working in education. Our students have participated in fixtures throughout the year, been involved in a myriad of extra-curricular and enrichment activities, hiked across Wiltshire on their Duke of Edinburgh Award expeditions, gone on school trips, participated in musical performances, the school production and the Evening of Dance, and joined in with innumerable other events and activities. It has been a pleasure and privilege to attend many of our whole school events and I am very proud of the commitment shown by the students involved in all of our extra-curricular activities. I am reluctant to highlight specific events but I do feel that I have to mention, again, the amazing achievement of our U14 girls football team in winning the Somerset Cup and also the school production of West Side Story, which was, I am sure those of you who watched it will agree, amazing.

As ever, the end of the school year is tinged with sadness as we say goodbye to staff who are leaving us. A number of staff are moving on to promoted posts in other schools, these include Lucy James, who has been appointed as Deputy Headteacher at Churchill School, Dan Fox, who is joining Sheldon School as Head of Geography and Lawrence Trowell who is going to Ralph Allen School as Head of English. We wish them success in their new roles. Other staff leaving to work in other schools are Charlotte Noakes to Frome College and Ivonnes Langsi to Clifton College. Jessie Garbutt is relocating to Hungary, Jonathan Clarke to Egypt and Mhairi Zeigler to Germany. Vicky Vipond, Paul Burford and Ben Makroum are also leaving us at the end of this term to pursue careers in another sector. My thanks also to Dymphna Skehill who has taught Miss Grimes class this term. Sophie Cornelius and Penny Bird will be starting their maternity leave at the end of this term (I will keep you posted on any developments here!) and Juan Martos is leaving us temporarily on shared parental leave. Other staff leaving us are our Science Technicians Jenny Beard, who is retiring, and Tyrone Falls, who has a new job working for the British Council in Spain. Two of our SEND team, Lowri Morgan and Naomi Tarrant are leaving us to follow careers in teaching and Elle Pursey is going to university.

Lastly Jan Malt, our English Leader of Learning is retiring after 25 years teaching at the school. Jan joined the school in 1997 and has made a huge contribution to the school and the wider community over this period. She will be greatly missed by us all and we wish her all the best in the future.

Oldfield Focus: Rewilding

You may have noticed that we are taking steps to invite nature back into the school grounds through our rewilding scheme. Rewilding involves returning land back to a more natural state by doing nothing to it and allowing nature to flourish. This will often lead to a more biodiverse area. At Oldfield, we have started to allow a section near the Orchard to grow wild; the hope is that nature of all sizes will return to this area- what will you spot over the coming months?

How do you get to school?

Car sharing and public transport is an easy option to **cut your CO₂ emissions**. Could you start walking or cycling to school?

It was a fantastic 2 days and there was time at the end for fish and chips to round the trip off. Mr Santarpino, Geography Teacher




New Intake Day

Maths Workshop


















Let's Make Music!


The Battle of the Bands was supported by the OSA, who are always so generous with their time and energy, and we were joined by our three


U13 Cricket Champions!



You will talk confidentially with a trained Citizens Advice adviser, who can help address your crisis; provide support to maximise your income; assist you to navigate the benefits system; and identify any additional grants you could be entitled to. If needed, they will issue you with a voucher so you can get an emergency food parcel from your local foodbank (see below).
