We hosted our AGM this year in the library at school. It was a lovely gathering of parents, staff and governors to go through the OSA activities and accounts, discuss how we've helped the school and what we want to do going forward.

Here are some of the highlights of the help we have provided school;

Thrive – Mrs Keaveney and Miss Clark

'By the OSA providing funding for Thrive we are able to support our students with various activities during their 1-1 sessions. This enables us to build trusting relationships with them, which in turn supports students with their social and emotional learning. We used the funding to purchase items such as board games, Play-Doh and Hama beads. Our students thoroughly enjoy being able to use all of the items which we have been able to purchase. Both us and students are very grateful for the support received by the OSA!'

And from the students: 'This is definitely my favourite room in the whole school.' 'Couldn't believe how much stuff we have; can we make something else up, Miss?'

'The OSA helped us to buy 5 brand new, state of the art cameras at the start of last year. This has hugely benefitted the department and students who previously struggled to access the course are now able to borrow cameras through our loan system and are no longer disadvantaged through lack of expensive equipment. Lessons have also been impacted positively. Before students were sharing one camera between 2 or 3 students, they now have access to their own. This has transformed the teaching of Photography at both GCSE and A level and we are incredibly grateful as a team – thank you so much!'

Music – Victoria Robinson

'The OSA funded the hire of a class set of brass instruments so that we could deliver a whole class ensemble programme of teaching across Year 7. Fewer and fewer students are getting to experience live music, nor do they get opportunities to hear, touch and play classical instruments. Many students at our school arrive in Year 7 having had very limited musical experiences throughout the whole of primary school. Through this project every single child in Year 7 was given the opportunity to learn to play a brass instrument over the space of two terms. This is such an important project and it is my belief that it has had a real positive influence on many of our students, especially some the most disadvantaged who might not otherwise ever have touched a musical instrument. Without the initial funding from the OSA this project might never have got off the ground!'

From our students:

It was hard at the start but eventually I managed to play quite a few pieces and even at the school concert. For some of my friends it was a novel experience and the first time they had ever held a professional instrument. Some even managed to play with the orchestra in West Side Story and are continuing to study their instruments. The brass project was awesome because it was noisy, hard and fun to learn.

I enjoyed playing the brass instruments, it was fun to play Mamma Mia on the trumpet.

At Oldfield School Sixth Form, we run a comprehensive programme of support for students interested in applying to Oxford and Cambridge. This year seven Year 12 students took part in the visit, and travelled up to Cambridge Trinity Hall. The visit was an invaluable experience for them to find out more about information on applications, a chance to get to know our link College, hear a sample lecture and to enjoy the city.
