EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

Design and Technology STEM Year 10 & 12 Legoland trip

On Monday 22nd May, 43 Year 10 and 12 Design and Technology students attended a LEGO Education Robotics Challenge at Legoland Windsor.

Everyone had an amazing day out. The day involved fun, STEM learning and creativity.

The Lego Robotics challenge brought Design and Technology STEM learning to life outside of the classroom through a fun, hands-on workshop. The students

loved working in teams completing challenges using LEGO robots. They built, coded and debugged robotic electric vehicles.

They developed their problem-solving skills and learnt more about algorithms, sequences, and inputs and outputs, as well as applying mathematical skills such as estimation, measurement

and the use of angles to get their robotic vehicles moving around the map.

It was a fantastic learning experience and there was even time to fit in a few rollercoaster rides to add to the excitement.

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Shepton Mallet Prison Trip

On Monday 19th June, a fantastic day out was had to Shepton Mallet Prison for Year 10 Sociology GCSE students. They had a tour of the prison, which was led by an ex-prison officer with encyclopaedic knowledge of the prison's history, from when it opened to the day it closed. Students heard first-hand what life inside a prison is like and discovered the prison's history dating back more than 400 years.

The tour experience took place in all areas of the prison, including the 19th century hard labour yard, the treadwheel

house, the Old Gate Lodge, original cells dating from the 17th century, the largest prison wing with 94 cells, the exercise yard, and the execution room.

Students were also able to explore Shepton Mallet Prison in small groups, whilst completing activity booklets. To finish, students were able to ask their tour guide questions about his experience as a prison officer in an informal setting, before being awarded their Certificate of Completion.

One student's highlight of the day was "getting to know the personal experiences of prisoners, and prison guards, and learning about how prisons have changed over time."

This trip aimed to enhance students understanding of how the criminal justice system operates and allowed them to consider the pros and cons of different forms of punishment. This trip will now be very useful in preparing them for their "Crime and Deviance" unit, which will be studied in Year 11.

Inclusion

Our library collection reflects the wide variety of experiences and backgrounds of our students, helping to build empathetic, literate, and well-rounded young adults. The librarian ensures there is access to good quality books and that all students are represented and catered for in the library. Books are essential not only for literacy, but also mental health, and academic attainment - the stronger their reading skills the better students will do in all subjects.

Positive Life Experiences

Our library brings important events and experiences to students like author visits, extra-curricular clubs, and a feeling of ownership over the space. It is a vital wellbeing hub where students can be themselves without judgement. The library has many Library Helpers who volunteer their time to help at break and lunch times, an inclusive Book Club and The Literacy Hub which includes The Young Editors programme.

Improved Academic Results

School libraries are proven to combat poverty through improved academic outcomes while increasing positive attitudes towards learning. There is good quality collaboration, where teachers and our librarian work well together creating an atmosphere of positive learning. Evidence proves that school libraries:

- Alleviate teacher workload.
- Increase efficiency for schools.
- Contribute to the delivery of a well-rounded education.
