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#### Head's Lines

I am quite sure that your son or daughter will be looking forward to the holiday next week after what has been a long and busy term. As ever the school year seems to race by and we will soon be preparing for mock examinations for Year 11, the School Carol Concert and, no doubt, starting to prepare for Christmas.

It has been a very rewarding and enjoyable first term at Oldfield School from my perspective. I continue to be impressed by the conduct of the students, the respect that they show towards each other and staff and their willingness to engage in their learning and in the wider life of the school. The school is a busy place during the day but it is very gratifying to see that large numbers of our students are participating in extra-curricular activities at the end of the school day and I would encourage you to continue to support them in attending these. With regards to clubs and activities we have had a very successful start to the year with a number of boys and girls sports teams having some excellent results. Results in rugby have been particularly impressive with a 45-15 win for Year 7 this week against Beechen Cliff and a similarly impressive win from our Year 9s two weeks ago. There were some excellent netball results against Broadlands Academy last week for our Year 8 and Year 9 teams, neither team conceded any points.

I had the privilege to accompany Year 9 on the trip earlier this month to the battlefields in Flanders and the Somme. We participated in the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate and walked over the trenches used by British and Empire soldiers on the first day of the Somme. Our students were a credit to the school and as the trip progressed you could see how their understanding of the tragedy and enormity of the events that took place around these sites developed. Regardless of the number of times I have visited, I am always deeply affected by the experience and I know that this was also the case for our students.

We are in the process of redesigning and rebranding the school website and are hopeful that this will be launched during term 2. This will also involve changes to the content and improvements in functionality, I am very excited about this and the changes to our branding. These reflect the current ethos and culture of the school but place them in a more contemporary context. I am sure that you will approve once you see the finished article; there is a sneak preview included in this newsletter. Following the launch of the website we will be asking parents and staff for feedback on how we can further improve both features and content.

Thank you to all of our parents who supported the school with allowing their child to assist at the Open Evening in September. It was an incredibly busy and successful event and the feedback from our visitors was universally positive about the students that they encountered during the evening. I had informed prospective parents in my presentation that the best advertisement for the school is our students and they did not disappoint.

We have been interviewing for a new Assistant Headteacher on Thursday and Friday of this week. You may be aware that Mrs James will be leaving on maternity leave at the end of this term and we are appointing an additional Assistant Headteacher to take on Mrs James' responsibilities for the remainder of this year and to grow the senior team to reflect the growth in size of the school. We have had an exceptionally strong field of candidates and I will update you on the outcomes from these interviews next term.

We have agreed the term dates for 2018-2019 and these are published with this newsletter. They will also be published on the website. Regarding dates can I remind parents that Friday 18<sup>th</sup> November is a school closure day. Wishing you an enjoyable and restful break.

#### Reminder – PE Kits

#### Pick up at the end of school

Parents will be aware that the school is working hard to ensure that the end of day arrangements are safe and well managed for our students; in particular that our students stay safe when crossing the roads as they leave the school. One of the issues that has been identified is that of cars being parked on the single white lines on either Penn Hill Road or Kelston Road. While it is legal to do so, this creates significant issues for traffic on the road and also blind spots for students crossing the road. It would be very much appreciated if cars were not parked here at the end of the day. Thank you for your assistance with this.



#### Year 9 Battlefields Trip

We recently returned from our biggest Battlefields trip yet – 93 students and 8 teachers made the journey to Belgium and Northern France. The trip was a great success, and the students gained a much deeper understanding of the scale and the horror of the First World War. We visited several locations around Ypres, which was the site of three terrible battles during the war, and also made our way down to the Somme, where some of the worst fighting took place. These sobering visits to cemeteries and memorials were balanced with free time for the students in the town of Ypres, a visit to the swimming pool in Menin and the exotic cultural experience of a visit to a French supermarket. The Year 9s did us proud and represented the school very well, especially J. C. Horrocks and Gabrielle Norman who presented the wreath on our behalf at the Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate.


