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Dear Parents/Carers

As you may be aware the public examination period is about to start in earnest next week. We are about to select our prefects and Year 10 students who have applied will be interviewed next week. Our current Year 11 prefects have been the first in role and have done a fantastic job; making a real difference to the organisation of the school and have set a high standard for others to follow. I am sure that Year 10 will rise to the challenge and contribute in just as positive a way. We will be selecting the student leadership team from our Year 12 students and Year 10 prefects shortly and I will update you in the next newsletter with the outcome from this process.

It is a particularly busy period for Year 10, they have just completed their mock examinations and a large number participated (along with Year 9) in the Duke of Edinburgh practice expedition during the Bank Holiday weekend. They are also preparing for their work experience placements at the end of June which will take place during activities week.

The number of articles in the newsletter this term will give you a sense of the wide range of activities and events taking place at the school. Excellent academic outcomes for our students are our first priority but we must not lose sight of the value of the wider school experiences as these provide the opportunities for us to develop the skills and attributes required to be successful in life. I am hugely appreciative of the time and commitment of our staff in running these activities and trips and the school is a richer and better place as a consequence.

A number of staff are joining the school this term. Russell Driver was appointed as Leader of Learning; PE and Dance last term and will be joining the school on Monday 21st May. This week we've launched the Sugar Smart initiative at Oldfield school. This is a national initiative supported by the Jamie Oliver Food Foundation and Sustainable Food Cities. It is a campaign to help schools and individuals reduce the amount of sugar we all consume.

We've pledged to become 'Sugar Smart' and anyone can join us in our campaign. It is a great way to help young people and their families understand the hidden sugars in everyday food and drink and support them to make some simple changes to reduce their sugar intake – and

reduce the chances of becoming overweight or obese.

Did you know adults and children in our area are, on average, consuming three times more sugar than we should?

We started this week with a launch assembly, where we guessed how many teaspoons of sugar are in a McDonald's medium strawberry milkshake. The answer is 14, which is twice the daily recommended sugar intake for KS3 students!

What else will we be doing? We have pledged to get students involved in Sugar Smart activities and have also pledged to be an energy drink free school. We're also asking anyone to add to the campaign, so you are more than welcome to do your bit for the Sugar Smart Campaign.





### Lost Property




### **HUMANITIES**

The Humanities Learning Area includes a broad and diverse range of subjects. At their core they all enable young people to understand and critically interpret the world they live in. We strive to equip students with the necessary skills and attributes (subject specific and transferable) to be effective and responsible citizens, in community and global contexts.

The humanities are delivered by a talented and dedicated group of teachers. Geography is taught to all years and is delivered by a team of four specialists: Mr Fox, Mr Crow, Mrs James and myself, Mr Peacock. History is also taught to all year groups and is led by Mr Allen, the rest of the History team are: Mrs Cross, Mrs Mills, Mrs Jeremy, Mr Mackay and Ms Merriman, who are all History specialists with a diverse range of areas of expertise. Religious Studies is led by Ms Bird and also includes Mrs Edmondson who specialise in Christianity, Buddhism and Islam. Religious Studies is taught to all years. Social Sciences is led by Mr Fenwick and includes psychology which is taught at A Level, sociology which is taught at A Level and for the first time this year at GCSE. Ms Lobbett also teaches A Level Psychology. Social Sciences also includes child development and health and social care which is taught by Mrs Clark and is delivered to GCSE and A Level.

The world, and the way we conceptualise it, is constantly changing and it is important that the curriculum reflects this. Consequently, the curriculum is continually being updated and kept relevant; for example, history recently introduced a module on migration and geography produced one on globalisation. In addition to the diverse and exciting schemes of work, we offer a broad range of extra-curricular opportunities. Already this year humanities students have had the opportunity to visit Bristol Harbourside with geography and Berlin with history. There are also many exciting trips coming up before the end of the academic year including Clevedon (Year 10 and 12), Burrington Coombe (Year 7), Lulworth Cove (Year 8), Battlefields (Year 9), visiting a synagogue and mosque (Year 7). All of these trips are opportunities for students to develop and extend their knowledge and understanding of the world around them.

The team who deliver Humanities all have a deep knowledge and passion for their subject and a broad range of teaching experience. We believe the different subjects all enrich the lives of individual learners and help develop a capacity to critically reflect on and question relationships between ourselves and 'others' in our complex, shifting world. Students in the humanities also develop the essential transferable skills needed in the world of work. It is an exciting time for the humanities at Oldfield: student numbers studying them are increasing, new courses are being offered and new extra-curricular trips developed.

### **UK Mathematics Trust Team Challenge**

Congratulations to our team of four Year 8 students who took part in the UKMT Team Challenge at the Royal High School, Bath on Friday 20th April. The team was Cara Holway, Maddie Rawcliffe, Nathan Finch and Tate Hopkins. They came 6th out of 18 teams which was a great result, especially considering that other teams included students from Year 9. The challenge



consisted of four rounds: the group round, the cross-number, the shuttle and the Relay. Each round lasted 45 minutes and required tactics and teamwork as well as mathematical skills. Cara, Maddie, Nathan and Tate worked brilliantly together and drew upon the strategies and skills that they have been using at codebreakers' club on Monday lunchtimes. ### **Oldfield School welcomes MP Wera Hobhouse**

Oldfield School students were excited to welcome local MP Wera Hobhouse to hear about their progress on The Scholars Programme - a prestigious national scheme which gives school pupils an opportunity to experience university-style learning.

The Programme is part of a wider initiative involving 172 students from across Years 7, 10 and 11, designed to encourage the Most Able students to have high aspirations and expectations of themselves and their



achievements whilst at school and beyond. The initiative involves aspirational mentoring and a series of lectures and workshops held during lunch times at school, created and led by teaching staff. Within Oldfield School there is a rich, varied range of university level expertise and staff have been excited by the prospect of sharing this wealth of knowledge with the students selected for this programme.

Wera Hobhouse met some of the 32 students from Years 7, 10 and 12 who are currently involved in The Scholars Programme which places PhD Tutors in schools, teaching university-style tutorials to groups of four to six pupils. This is proving to be a unique opportunity for the students to experience university-style teaching whilst working with a world-leading expert. Those engaged in the programme are currently attending PhD tutorials once a week and preparing a 2,000-word dissertation on Neuroscience, Feminism in French Literature, and working as 'Disease Detectives'! All students have attended a launch trip to either Cambridge or Exeter University and, if successful, will graduate from the programme at a leading Russell Group University.

Wera Hobhouse said: "It was great to visit Oldfield School today, and meet pupils taking part in The Scholars Programme. I was very impressed at how they engaged with such a complex and challenging academic topic. It just goes to show what young people from Bath can achieve if we give them the opportunity. I wish the pupils the very best for the future, and I encourage more schools to give their pupils the chance to benefit from this programme".

Jessica Lobbett, Assistant Headteacher said: "I was delighted to meet with Wera Hobhouse and show her the excellent work our students are doing in The Scholars Programme. I am very proud of the achievements of all of our students and I am excited to see how their participation in the programme inspires their study and future opportunities."
