Year 12 CERN Trip

Last month our Year 13 physics students went to Geneva, Switzerland to the site of the large hadron collider at CERN. This was a joint trip with 3 other sixth forms in the area. Students visited the site where the Higgs Boson was recently discovered. It was inspirational to be at such an important facility which has been so fundamental to developments in physics. Whilst at CERN students were given talks by researchers, as well as a guided tour of the CMS detector which is just across the border in France. Students took up the opportunity to visit the two interactive exhibition centres which taught about the Big Bang, and about CERN itself.

Students also enjoyed a visit to the Red Cross Museum and were given a guided tour of the UN buildings in Geneva. Students used their free time in Geneva to see the lake, visit the sights and museums, and some chose to return to CERN to see the






TRIPS AND EVENTS

British Army STEM session

A selection of our Year 9 students were lucky enough to take part in a STEM session organised by the Army. The sessions were planned so the students could utilise their computer science skills to construct and then program a robotic Lego model. The students were able to design their own models as part of brief called Operation Disaster Relief, and they were tasked with being able to pick up and transport a vital piece of equipment using their robotic model.

Over the two hour sessions, there were some very dedicated groups who managed to make and program their model to move independently. Some of the students were able to utilise the movement and motion sensors to help their robot sense objects to avoid. The level of teamwork was evident in the students and there were numerous examples of the students developing a much more resilient approach to their learning. Hopefully this will enthuse some of these students to consider computer programming and robotics as a potential career opportunity!


