THE LIBRARY



The Library is a whole school facility which endeavours to serve the needs of all students from Years 7 to 13. The Library is open all day, before and after school as well as during break and lunch time. Students can access a wide range of fiction and non-fiction during these extra opening times but also during their English reading lessons in the library. Students have access to computers and a printer and can complete and print their school work at break and lunch time.

Students can also get involved in Games Club and have access to a variety of games including Chess, Uno and Connect Four during lunch time. Book Club is held every Wednesday lunch time for avid readers, Sci-Fi Club on some Mondays after school, and for the weeks building up to Harry Potter Book Night, we host Harry Potter Craft Sessions every Monday after school.







500 Words Competition

Nic Pearce has the privilege of being a Judge on Radio 2's 500 Words Competition.

For those of you who have not heard of "500 Words", it is the UK's most successful short story-writing competition for children between the ages of 5 and 13. All children can enter, no matter what their ability, experience, or background. In 2018 134,790 children entered the competition, and since it launched in 2011, the competition has received over 800,000 short stories.

Stories are judged anonymously, without regard to grammar, punctuation or spelling. The competition culminates in a broadcast extravaganza of live music and sensational story-telling every summer, at a special venue. There is an amazing author panel this year: Malorie Blackman, Charlie Higson, Frank Cottrell-Boyce and Francesca Simon who Nic is dying to meet!

Preparing Our Year 12s for Their Next Steps

Five of our students were fortunate to attend the BANES Oxbridge conference and learn about how the application process to Oxford or Cambridge works, what life is like in those illustrious institutions and attend a sample lecture.

Finally, we took most of Year 12 on a trip to Cardiff University Open Day so they could find out what a Russell Group university has to offer, take a peek at student accommodation and sample the food on offer in a typical uni refectory.


Year 11 football v Writhlington 12.03.19

This sparked Writhlington into life using the tactic of breaking fast from the Oldfield pressure to slot home the equaliser. A consistent performer, Ferdi Symons then latched onto a through ball only to be taken down inside the box by a desperate defender. Sixth Form Football

On Thursday 14th February Oldfield Sixth Form football team travelled to Ralph Allen school for their first fixture of this year's campaign. The game started quite slowly as both teams found their own rhythm. Fortunately, after 9 minutes following a monstrous kick from Korey Hurle in goal, Emmanuel Omoniyi gambled to get in behind the Ralph Allen defence and was able to nudge the ball past the helpless goalkeeper to open the scoring. Year 10 Mock Interviews



Wembley England v Czech Republic


