Dear Parents and Carers

Before I proceed with the customary end of year announcements I feel that I need to reflect on what has been quite the most challenging school year that any of us will have experienced. Firstly, I want to thank you again for your patience, support and resilience over the previous 12 months, as your response to the demands that have been placed on you as parents has been amazing. I also want to thank parents who have written to me to thank school staff for their efforts this year; I have shared these with staff and they have been most welcome.

When we reopened back in September 2020, I confess I felt a large degree of uncertainty over how the school community would respond to what was going to be a very different school experience for us all. There was no part of school life that was going to be unaffected by Covid; from the seemingly trivial, such as not sharing a glue stick, to measures that had a huge impact on school life such as extra-curricular activities and the structure of the school day. I was very conscious of the potential impact on learning, but even more so on behaviour, wellbeing and on our cohesiveness and sense of community. Without question, all of these have been adversely impacted. However, I am immensely proud of the way that your children have responded and the efforts made by staff at the school to minimise the impact on our students.

It is too early to be certain about what lies ahead in the new school year but I remain hopeful that we will be able to return to something resembling normality and, if this is not possible, then I am confident that students, staff and parents will continue to work together to overcome any challenges; as we have done over the last year.

Sadly we have not been able to end the school year as intended and all of the events planned for this week have been cancelled. This included a performance on Penn Field by Rak-Su, which was to be a surprise thank you for our students and, unfortunately, this event cannot now be rescheduled. We have, however, been able to say goodbye to our Year 11 and 13 students at their celebration events last week and I am looking forward to seeing them again at their proms in August and September respectively. We wish our Year 11 and 13 leavers all the best for the future and look forward to welcoming back those Year 11 students who are joining our Sixth Form in September.

We were able to complete most of our sports day events (albeit over more than one day), although Year 7 were unable to participate because of self-isolation. It was a thoroughly enjoyable event and a welcome reminder of more normal times. The winner of the House Shield will be announced in the extended tutor period at the end of this term.

We have appointed the Sixth Form leadership team from a very strong field, the Head Student is Ruby Pearce; Oliver Phillips and Paula Ifrim will be her deputies. Congratulations on their appointments and also to the other Year 13 students who are in leadership positions next year. We will appoint our Year 11 prefects and Year 11 student leadership team at the start of next year.

Teaching staff leaving at the end of this year include Tom Allen, who is moving to Munich to teach in an international school, and Ross Fenwick, also departing abroad to teach in Dubai. Anna Taylor is leaving to join a school in Manchester and Jamie Pearce has been promoted to Head of Creatives in a school in Devon. Jessica Davies has also been promoted to the post of Head of Music in a Gloucestershire school. Kim Reed is retiring having taught in our English Department since 2004. We wish her all the best for the future and I would like to thank her for all that she has done for the school and our students over the previous 19 years. John King is also retiring this year after 14 years as site caretaker. He will be missed by us all, as will his encyclopaedic knowledge of the school site. Amy Vickery has been promoted to the role of Head of Year at Winterbourne Academy so will no longer be covering lessons in school for teaching colleagues. Holly Paillin is leaving our pastoral team to undertake teacher training. Jayne Barton is leaving our SEND team and Victoria Cornwall is leaving the Sixth Form team to move back to Sussex.

We start back at school on Thursday 2nd September; this is an inset day for staff only, as is the following day. The first school day for Year 7, 10 and 12 will be Tuesday 7th September; for Years 10 and 12 this will be a

GCSE / Sixth Form Induction Day. Years 11 and 13 will start on Wednesday 8th September and Years 8 and 9 on Thursday 9th September. The staggered start to the year will allow us to complete two lateral flow tests for each student before they return to school in September. We will write to you in more detail about the testing arrangements later in the holiday. I will also write to update you on what Covid-19 mitigation measures will be in place in September as, although we have had some guidance on this, I am anticipating that additional guidance will be shared with schools at some point over the holiday.

I hope that you are able to have a very enjoyable and relaxing summer.

No doubt this year has been rather turbulent with unexpected challenges faced by the pandemic and pressure on both students and staff. We have attempted to alleviate some of that pressure through setting up a staff virtual running team. The

In March the Oldfield Virtual Running Team entered a nationwide school staff virtual 5k team relay competition. With 43 competing school staff teams, our very own social staff team came 6th overall! Since then we have entered 4 additional competitions throughout Term 4 - 6, and the most impressive highlight was the most recent team relay; Oldfield came 9th overall in the Team Relay, Amy Green came 4th in the women's individual race with a time of 24:47 and Chris Gann came 9th in the men's individual race with a time 21:50, all these results are very impressive considering over 400 runners took part and represented over 80 schools!

We hope to continue the enthusiasm for running in the next school year and are pleased it has had such a positive impact on people's wellbeing. Thank you to everyone who has contributed to the spirit in the team and hopefully we can inspire more staff and students to give running a go!
