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Dear Parents/Carers,

Thank you for your support this term. While it has been a relatively short term it has also been a very busy and productive one in many areas of the life of the school.

Our sports teams have had a successful term. ## Attendance Matters

As we move into the second half of the academic year, attendance becomes even more important as Year 10 and 11 students prepare for their mock exams and GCSEs in the summer. Year 9 students will be choosing their option subjects and beginning to learn GCSE content and all KS3 students will sit end of year exams to monitor their progress. The table below shows how attendance is impacted by varying amounts of days off. A student with 96% attendance will have missed 8 days in the school year



which equates to 40 lessons whilst a student at 90% will have missed a staggering 95 lessons. It is vital for students to be attending as many lessons as possible to maximise their potential achievements.

Punctuality is also a key factor in school attendance. School starts at 8.30am and students are expected to be in tutor time. Tutor time is an important part of school life as it's a time for sharing key messages and also for implementing revision strategies and interventions. We are aware bus timetables have changed recently however these have been in place for over 2 weeks now. This is ample time for students to know the new times in order to get to school on time. Bus issues are not a reason for lateness unless there is a specific issue

which, as a school, we are usually aware of.

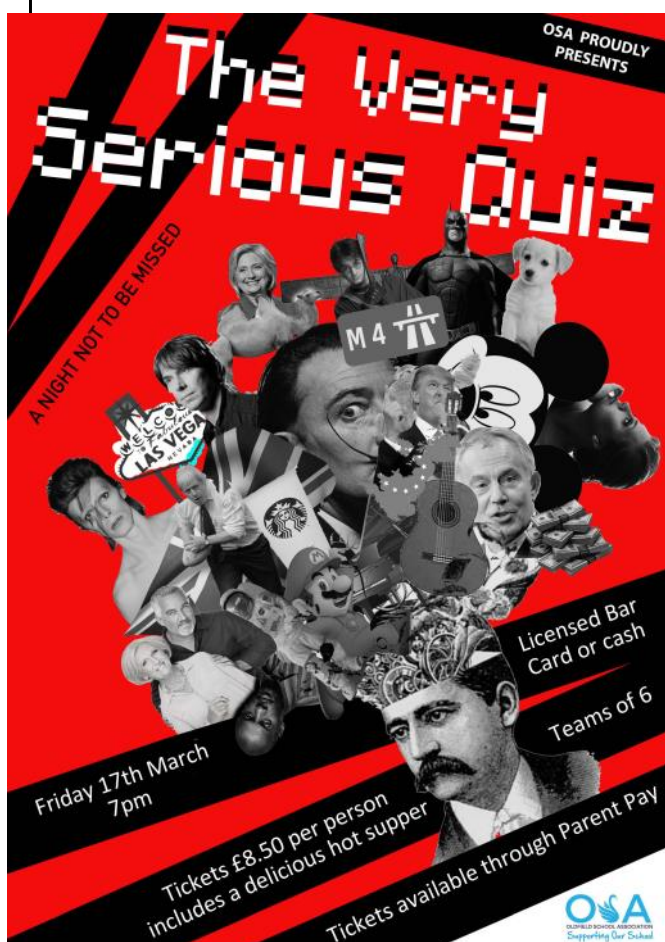
### Quiz Night

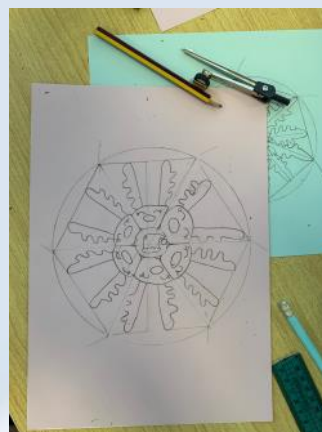

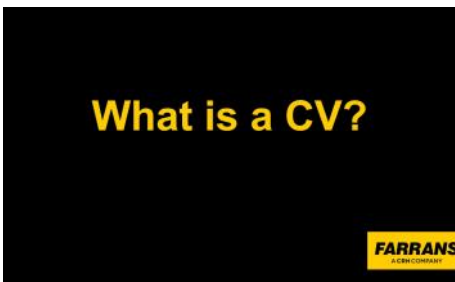


We continue to work with the National Theatre through their New Views playwrighting programme.

## Cystic Fibrosis Talk to Year 13 Health and Social Care students

As part of their preparation for their anatomy and physiology exam in January Mike Priscott came and talked to Year 13 Health and Social Care students about his and his family's experience of Cystic Fibrosis (CF). Three out of four of Mike's children have cystic fibrosis and he gave a detailed account of the challenges that he and his wife have faced throughout their lives. Cystic Fibrosis is a genetic disorder that can affect the lungs and digestive system. Sufferers need daily physiotherapy and medication and can suffer from chest infections as well as weight loss due to an inability to digest nutrients. There is no cure for CF but Mike told us of a new medication that has just been approved by the NHS that significantly reduces the impact of CF.

Despite the many challenges his family has faced Mike remains positive and has dedicated a lot of his time to raising awareness of the condition and is an award winning fundraiser for the Cystic Fibrosis Trust. An invaluable talk ahead of their exam but Mike's visit also helped us understand the challenges that sufferers face and the resilience required when living with cystic fibrosis. ### Real, live courtroom drama!

A group of Year 12 and Year 13 students were lucky enough to experience a trip to the Old Bailey in London as part of their Sociology and Psychology studies.

Students were able to wander through the secret alleys and courtyards of the Inns of Court, in the footsteps of some of the country's most renowned legal minds, before moving on to the Old Bailey, the country's leading criminal court, for a talk outside on the fascinating history of the Old Bailey and the trials covered by the guide which shocked the nation.

Following the tour, students were given details of the most interesting cases being heard on the day of the visit and they were able to take their pick of the criminal case that they would most like to observe in court. The Old Bailey hears more murder trials than any other court in the country. It was an eye-opening event for many of our students and really helped consolidate this area of the course that we have been studying.

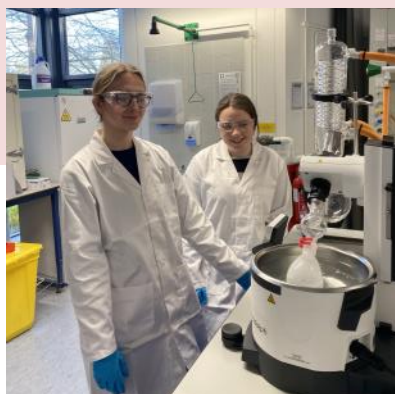
### Experimental visit to Bath University

On Wednesday 18th January, Year 12 and Year 13 students currently studying chemistry for A levels, had the opportunity to visit Bath University for the day in order to experience working in the labs and use new, high-tech equipment.

To begin the trip, we toured around the campus looking at the lecture halls, sports centre and accommodation which allowed us to observe university life. After a tour from Miss Millett, who attended Bath University, we went to the labs and met the team of chemists that worked there. They explained how to use the lab equipment to separate aspirin from an unknown component in a sample of Bathenone. This allowed us to enhance our knowledge of organic chemistry and learn about how it all

works. Furthermore, we were fortunate enough to go and see some of the machines used for identifying drugs like aspirin including an NMR machine and a mass spectrometry machine.

Students in Year 9 have concentrated on coping with peer pressure and understanding the law in relation to Drugs and Alcohol Education. Later in the year the Avon and Somerset Police TOPAZ Team will be coming to talk more about this subject as well as online safety.
