Pupil Premium and Free School Meals

Pupil Premium is extra funding allocated to schools to work with students who have been registered for Free School Meals at any point in the last six years. The government believes that Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address current underlying inequalities between students who are eligible for Free School Meals and their peers. It ensures that funding to tackle disadvantage, reaches the students who need it.

In most cases, the Pupil Premium is paid direct to schools and is allocated to them for every student who receives Free School Meals. Schools decide how to use the funding as they are best placed to assess student needs. The funding is directed specifically at the pupils in receipt of this funding, and could be used for items such as one-to-one or small group tuition, non-academic intervention, or help with costs for trips, equipment, uniform etc. It is discreet and pupils in receipt of it are not singled out in any way. We encourage you to get in touch with us if you think your child may be eligible for funding. The money is available for every child whose parents are receiving certain benefits but the school will only receive the funding if parents register.

Extra funding for children of Service Personnel

There is also extra funding available under Pupil Premium for those children who have a parent currently serving in the armed services, or those whose parents have left the service since April 2011. This provision is made for additional (mainly pastoral) support, so we would be grateful if any Service Personnel could inform the school of their status, so we can record this information on the school system. This information is protected and the data regarding individual children is not shared outside the school. Schools with Service children in Reception to Year 11 classes are eligible to receive the fund, but only if your child's name appears on the school's roll as being a Service child, so please let us know. At lam on a cold Friday morning, 48 Year Nine students departed Oldfield for Ypres, Belgium on the History Department's Battlefields Trip. The students visited Langemark German and Tyne Cot Commonwealth Cemeteries, where they were able to compare the approach taken to remembrance by the two sides after the conflict. At Langemark, they were amazed by the mass grave containing the remains of over 24,000 soldiers and were overwhelmed by the rows of over 11,000 crosses at Tyne Cot, the largest Commonwealth Cemetery in the world.

In the evening, the group took part in the Menin Gate Ceremony, a remembrance event that has been held every evening since 1928. It takes place in the shadow of the Menin Gate, a memorial that lists the names of more than 54,000 soldiers who died in fighting around the Ypres region but have no known grave. Students placed a personalised wreath on

behalf of the staff and students of Oldfield School.

One of the highpoints of the trip was discovering what life was like for soldiers living in the trenches around Ypres. The students were fascinated by the collections and exhibit at the Hooge Crater Museum and got very muddy exploring the original trenches and restored trench tunnel at Hill 62!

Unfortunately, the poor weather meant a 'choppy' and delayed return to school in the early hours of Sunday; but then another way of looking at this, was that we got to have even longer on a great trip! Thank you to the students who were amazing all trip, including during the delays.

TWO PLAYS IN TWO DAYS

In November, the year 12 and 13 English Literature students enjoyed two plays in two days to experience the plays we study, and compare, for one of our A level exams. First, we went into Bath's Rondo Theatre, in Larkhall to see A Streetcar Named Desire. As we got comfortable, we realised we had all sat on the wrong side of the theatre. After all shuffling across and finding our actual seats, the play began. Overall, I think The Rondo Theatre Company's production was fantastic and very accurate, almost exactly following the script.

From discussion, the only criticism I have is that the casting was different to how some of us pictured Stanley. But he did play him very well and I think we also acknowledge that we have been very influenced by Marlon Brando's 1950's portrayal. I also noticed chemistry in places I hadn't considered or read, such as between characters Blanche and Mitch.

But what stood out to me the most is the stunning stagecraft. For an amateur theatre company, the use of silhouettes integrated with music and lighting to show the state of Blanche's mind was incredible. On top of this, the use of drinks as props almost made alcohol another, increasingly prominent character, reflecting the deteriorating condition of the characters. Whilst aspects of the performance did differ from my reading, the accurate use of the script and gorgeous stage work presented a great performance of Williams' extraordinary play.

The next day, after a slight delay due to a punctured minibus tyre, we set out to London to see our partner play: The Duchess of Malfi. Once we arrived in Richmond, we got the overground to Waterloo, before walking to Trafalgar. After a quick lunch break, we headed into the Trafalgar Theatre at around 2.30. Despite being much larger than The Rondo, thanks to the angle of the seating, everyone seemed to have a great view of the stage, creating an atmospheric and intimate mood even before the play began. I think that this interpretation of The Duchess of Malfi was fantastic. I was sceptical at first as I knew it was a modern adaptation, but rather than overusing aspects of modernism, it adapted the Jacobean play to make it translate to a modern audience, without losing the beauty of its original language or censoring any aspects of the plot. It didn't change for a contemporary audience to try and make it more digestible, only more understandable. I think it was a really stunning and impressive performance that while having a





very simple set, didn't lose any details or grandeur, and when differing from my reading, only highlighted attributes of characters or relationships I hadn't seen.

Overall, I think that the modernist *Duchess* of *Malfi* allowed more obvious changes in approaches to certain characters, that clearly strayed from the script but purposely, to highlight traits we may not have read. Whereas in a *Streetcar Named Desire*, as it almost entirely followed the original script, when characters were presented differently it almost seemed in conflict to the audiences reading, as it wasn't overt in changes of presentation. However, for two plays written at very different times, and presented in very different ways, the continuous issues seen through both were presented beautifully and individually stood out strikingly in their styles.

Flock theatre visit and workshop

A Level students shared some of their examination work, whilst Year 10 students all performed duologues they have been preparing in class. Some of our talented Year 9 students performed an extract from Lord of the Flies whilst other students wrote and performed their own piece called #Robbery!. Other students from the Spotlight Drama club were directed by Year 13 in a performance of an extract from Love and Information. Year 9 students supported with technical lighting and Year 13 and Year 12 were stage managing backstage.

A Level Greek Theatre Workshop

Children in Need Events





Understanding risks and making healthy choices

Our focus at the start of the year was on the three main strands of PSHE in a set of lessons for all year groups called Everybody's Talking About; The Wider World, Healthy Lifestyles and Relationships. Students in all classes discuss a variety of issues from what is happening around us, considering our own health and thinking about our relationships with family and friends. Students are given the opportunity to get to know their new PSHE groups and this year we all spoke about our values and how they align with the new school values; **Be Kind. Be Ambitious. Be Resilient.**

In our curriculum lessons this term, Year 7 have been problem solving. Each lesson they watch an episode of a story about a fictional cyberattack. In their groups they have to work out the best plan of action to help wider communities, family and friends considering **Characteristics** such as compassion, respect and integrity.





In Year 8 we have been considering **Healthy Relationships** both within partnerships but also with our friends. Students should now be able to spot when things are not ok and have the confidence to ask for help or speak up. They have also focused on appropriate and inappropriate images and keeping ourselves safe when using our phones.

Year 9 have considered the law in relation to **drugs**. We have completed tasks and had class discussions on the effects of different drugs and the risks associated with experimenting with drugs. **Risk taking** has been a central theme as we've looked at other activities that involve risk, from riding a horse to gambling or jumping off a boat to starting new relationships. We have discussed the effects on our mental and physical health as we start making more choices on our own.

Year 10 focus groups last year asked for more information on finances so we have been recapping our understanding on a variety of **Money Matters**; banks, statements and inflation. Students have travelled back to 2015 and compared prices from then and now on weekly shops to recognise the impact of inflation on us all.

PSHE is also featuring in the **Skills Centre** with Mrs Macnaughton working alongside a small group of students who wanted to create their own display board on who inspires them as part of our **Black History Month work**. The culmination of their discussions, research and artwork is going up on display in the canteen for everyone to see in this final week. They are very proud of the work and excited about getting their icons being recognized by others around the school.


