

Pupil Premium and Free School Meals

Pupil Premium is extra funding allocated to schools to work with students who have been registered for Free School Meals at any point in the last six years. The government believes that Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address current underlying inequalities between students who are eligible for Free School Meals and their peers. It ensures that funding to tackle disadvantage, reaches the students who need it.


In most cases, the Pupil Premium is paid direct to schools and is allocated to them for every student who receives Free School Meals. Schools decide how to use the funding as they are best placed to assess student needs. The funding is directed specifically at the pupils in receipt of this funding, and could be used for items such as one-to-one or small group tuition, non-academic intervention, or help with costs for trips, equipment, uniform etc. It is discreet and pupils in receipt of it are not singled out in any way. We encourage you to get in touch with us if you think your child may be eligible for funding. The money is available for every child whose parents are receiving certain benefits but the school will only receive the funding if parents register.

Extra funding for children of Service Personnel

There is also extra funding available under Pupil Premium for those children who have a parent currently serving in the armed services, or those whose parents have left the service since April 2011. This provision is made for additional (mainly pastoral) support, so we would be grateful if any Service Personnel could inform the school of their status, so we can record this information on the school system. This information is protected and the data regarding individual children is not shared outside the school. Schools with Service children in Reception to Year 11 classes are eligible to receive the fund, but only if your child's name appears on the school's roll as being a Service child, so please let us know. Year 7 visit to Chepstow and Tintern

Two weeks ago, over 200 of our Year Seven students stormed the defences of the mighty Chepstow Castle but then 'paid penance for their sins' at Tintern Abbey!

They were taking part in the History Department's site visit to these two important medieval buildings. There were genuine gasps and squeals of excitement as the coaches crossed the River Severn into Wales and even more so when the impressive stone fortifications towered above us as we approached the main entrance to the castle.

Chepstow Castle is one of the UK's largest medieval fortifications and the students exhausted themselves exploring the mighty stone keep, the underground storage extensions and circumnavigating the extensive battlements. Along the way they completed a series of tasks helping them to identify and focus on the key features of this fortress, which was central to the Norman Conquest of Wales.

The highlights for many were the opportunity to explore the battlements and Great Tower which loom across the countryside and guard the River Wye.

We also had the opportunity to visit the impressive Tintern Abbey, also built under Norman leadership, but for monks from France to develop a religious community. Although much of the Abbey is now ruined, due to the later Dissolution of the Monasteries by Henry VIII in the 1530s, the students where still impressed with the medieval buildings, decoration and the fresh water drains which they took time to explore! The abbey gave a great insight into the strict life of religious prayer that was so important to medieval religious belief.

In subsequent History lessons, students will put this first-hand learning to good use as they evaluate the reasons why 'The Normans were a success'. This will involve work on understanding and explaining the use of brutal military tactics, combined with cultural offers and the clever winning over of the local population - aspects that Chepstow and Tintern effectively demonstrate. The students were able to experience first-hand a sample of these features, helping to bring this fascinating aspect of History to life.

HISTORY TRIP TO BERLIN

This January, 43 GCSE History students took part in a residential visit to Berlin, Germany. As part of their GCSE course, the students study Weimar and Nazi Germany and the Cold War, and the city of Berlin was central to some of the key events of these two eras.

Our first visit was to the Allied Museum and on the Saturday, we visited the Stasi Prison. The Allied Museum focuses on the history of the Cold War in Berlin, where Berlin was a 'flashpoint' for tensions between the USA and its allies and the USSR. The museum was dedicated to the idea of how Germany was able to rebuild itself after the war with the support of the USA despite some serious obstacles. One of these was the 1948-1949 Berlin Blockade where Russian troops cut the city off from the rest of Europe and made it necessary to supply the 2 million population of the city by air for nearly a year. The students were able to explore the remnants of a 'spy tunnel' dug by the Americans and British to tap Russian telephone lines in the city. The visit to the Stasi prison focused on how political prisoners were treated and interrogated under the totalitarian East German government from 1949 to the reunification of Germany in the 1990s.

We also visited the Reichstag and the Topography of Terror, which focuses on Nazi rule in Germany. During visits, our guides were keen to stress the importance of protecting democracy and the ease with which horrific crimes can be committed if ordinary people fail to stand-up and protect their basic rights. In the evening, some of the group also visited the East Side Gallery, the one remaining part of the Berlin Wall still intact and the Berlin Wall Memorial, which pays tribute to the people of all ages and backgrounds from as young as one year old, who died trying to cross into West Berlin and escape the dictatorship of East Germany.

We were also provided the opportunity to visit the Fernsehturm, or TV Tower, the 213m tall observation deck allowing magnificent views of the city in all its glory.

Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp, just outside Berlin was our final excursion before returning to the airport. The camp was built in 1936 by the Nazi Party, initially to hold political prisoners but was later used to detain other groups that the Nazis viewed as 'undesirable', including Jews and Russian prisoners of war. The students were able to see first-hand the appalling conditions of the barrack blocks that held the prisoners and the execution block,







which had a gas chamber and crematorium ovens for the removal of the evidence of the Nazi regime's crimes. During their time at the camp, the students were able to pay their respects to the more than 100,000 victims that died at the camp.

The trip certainly helped bring elements of the GCSE course and examination to a different reality.

Bristol photography trip

In the final week of Term 2, Photography students from Years 10 and 13 attended a resource gathering trip to Bristol. Over the course of a packed day, students explored the work of photographers in three different galleries and took two full photoshoots which will provide resources for their work going forwards.

The Martin Parr Foundation exhibited the incredible work of Trent Parke. Parke's high contrast, noir-style images often include figures blurred in motion, captured using slow shutter speeds. Having analysed the images, students were challenged to take their own shoot in the Paintworks area, considering how best to manipulate the exposure triangle to achieve similar effects.

The neighbouring Royal Photographic Society housed an interesting exhibition in which students focused on how outcomes can be presented in a range of ways. They also explored a timeline of camera developments, studying

their collection of historic and contemporary cameras.

Following lunch, the trip moved to the area around the Arnolfini Gallery. After exploring the work of Rinko Kawauchi, they moved to the crane area next to M Shed to take a photoshoot inspired by the dramatic, Constructivist perspectives of Aleksandr Rodchenko.

The day enabled all students to produce high quality photoshoots, supported by their teachers. Going forwards, they are now developing exciting, ambitious pieces inspired by the theme 'Urban'. We look forwards to working again with the Arnolfini, MPF and RPS next year. **Mr Rutter**




